

### TRAVEL MEDIA

A visit to the 9/11 Memorial and Museum is widely regarded as one of the most essential experiences in New York City. This addendum contains information for travel media, including logistical information for individuals who are planning a visit. Please refer to the backgrounder informational tool for general information about the Memorial and Museum.

### WHAT TO EXPECT

Visitors are welcome to explore the Museum at their own pace. An average visit can take about two hours. The historical exhibition may not be appropriate for visitors younger than 10 years of age. Adults accompanying younger visitors should exercise discretion before entering. All visitors are asked to respect this place made sacred through tragic loss.

### **Core Exhibitions**

The historical exhibition has three parts that examine the day of 9/11, before 9/11 and after 9/11. It tells the story of what happened on 9/11, including the events at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon and the story of Flight 93. The exhibition explores the background leading up to the events and examines their aftermath and continuing implications.

The memorial exhibition, which is named In Memoriam, commemorates the lives of those who perished on September 11, 2001 and February 26, 1993 and provides visitors with the opportunity to learn about the men, women and children who died.

#### **Public Programs**

As part of its mission to explore the global impact of 9/11 and its continuing significance, the Museum regularly hosts public programs that cover a wide array of contemporary topics. These programs invite experts from diverse backgrounds to offer insights and discuss their work on themes relating to national security, foreign policy, public safety and journalism, as well as culture, literature and the arts.

#### Film Features

Films are offered daily and are free to Museum visitors.

- "Facing Crisis: America Under Attack"
  Key 9/11 decision makers describe the events of the day. Features original interviews with
  President George W. Bush, New York Gov. George Pataki, New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani,
  among others. Screened exclusively at the 9/11 Memorial Museum. Auditorium, L-2 Level.
- "Facing Crisis: A Changed World"
   World leaders examine 9/11's impact on global events. Features original interviews with President George W. Bush, British Prime Minister Tony Blair, and Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf, among others. Screened exclusively at the 9/11 Memorial Museum. Auditorium, L-2 Level.
- "Rebirth at Ground Zero"
  This multi-screen film experience uses time-lapse footage and recorded interviews to present an inspiring firsthand perspective of the transformation and renewal of the World Trade Center site and the uplifting personal journeys of some of those most directly affected by the attacks. South Tower Footprint, C-4 Level.

## YOUTH AND FAMILIES

The Museum Guide for Children (PDF) is intended to help visitors 8 to 11 years old understand the history of the World Trade Center, what happened on 9/11, and how the site has been rebuilt. *Note:* Guide does not include the Museum's historical exhibition, September 11, 2001.

### **Activity Stations**

Drop-in activity stations are tied to specific artifacts and themes in the Museum and are intended to spark conversations between children and their guardians. Current activities offer age-appropriate entry points into the history of the World Trade Center, 9/11, and the aftermath.

The Memorial and Museum are located at the World Trade Center site in lower Manhattan at 180 Greenwich St. Visitors can currently access the Memorial at the intersection of Liberty Street and Greenwich Street, at the intersection of Liberty Street and West Street and at the intersection of West Street and Fulton Street. Visitors can also use the entrance at Fulton Street and Greenwich Street daily between 6 a.m. and 8 p.m. Click here for Google Maps directions.

## **TOURS**

### **Guided Museum Tours**

Join a staff member on a 60-minute guided tour of the Museum, examining authentic artifacts to understand what happened on 9/11, how people responded in the aftermath of the attacks, and the history and rebuilding of the World Trade Center. Tours are oriented for adult and teenage visitors. Tours are available daily and are offered in English only.

#### **Guided Memorial Tours**

Join a staff member on a 45-minute guided tour of the Memorial, exploring the symbolism behind the Memorial's design and the historical significance of the World Trade Center, and learn about what happened on 9/11. Tours are available daily and are offered in English only. Memorial Tours occur in rain or shine but are not offered in January and February.
